

Pickle Lake is a full-service community located in the heart of northwestern Ontario. Pickle Lake was initially developed as a mining community in the 1920's and has sustained the booms and busts of the industry throughout much of the century, seeing many former residents return to work and live in Pickle Lake. Airline companies provide daily flight service to northern communities and major cities including Winnipeg and Thunder Bay, and charter service to all outlying areas. Several land transportation companies provide freight service into and out of **Pickle Lake** in the warmer months and have extended service north of Pickle Lake during winter freeze-up. John Callan Pickle Lake has one of the most modern police stations in the province. Emergency ambulance service is provided by the Pickle Lake Volunteer Ambulance Service in addition to the Pickle Lake Volunteer Fire Department which provides fire protection and rescue services 24 hours a day. Pickle Lake is served by a newly-constructed medical clinic which offers medical and dental care to community residents. The building also houses the Northwestern Health Unit and Patricia Centre for Children and Youth. Crolancia Public School is an up-to-date modern public school offering education for children from kinder-Roger Potvin garten to grade nine. Post-secondary education Pickle Lake is a community for Families! is provided through Confederation College in Thunder Bay using Contact North. Private schooling with a biblical perspective is also available for grades one through twelve with Friendship Baptist Academy. The community has exceptional recreation facilities. The modern community hall is the focus of many events and houses a two-lane bowling alley. For winter sport enthusiasts, Pickle Lake boasts a curling rink with two sheets of ice and a large arena, utilized throughout the winter for hockey and public skating. Pickle Lake has an RV park, three municipally-run campgrounds and unsurpassed sport fishing opportunities. There is also plenty of opportunity for the avid hunter with the area being plentiful in moose, bear and game birds.
